Reflections from Pastor Barry

Dear Friends at St. Stephen's,

As I sit down to write my reflection for the newsletter, it is difficult for me to not be consumed with the events of these last days. The protests in Minneapolis, the marches happening there, and the deaths that have occurred there are ever before us and certainly heavy on our hearts. There are countless narratives as to what transpired. In this modern day, with cell phone cameras everywhere, you and I have the opportunity to see for ourselves. Still, it is difficult to "see" as we come to every scene, every frame before us with a particular bias. We are you we are. I am, who I am.



As a people of faith, we are called to set aside our personal bias and view the world and the events that unfold before us through the lens of Christ and in particular through the cross of Jesus. Our God, revealed in Jesus, walks among us, shares our sufferings, stands with the oppressed and marginalized and wounded and alienated, heals division, calls out hypocrisy, demands mercy- even for our enemies, and calls us to walk in the light of the power of love. Sometimes I wonder how it is that anyone would want to follow Jesus.

What I do know is that the Jesus revealed to me in the scriptures and by the power of God's most Holy Spirit, is that we are not to kill or defame or rush to judgment or to exclude or to stereotype. But then it seems to me that is all too often our human nature and the power of sin.

I find it difficult to believe, but with the arrival of February, we look to the season of Lent. Of what do we need to repent? What faults in our own lives do we need to work on? I never seem to have trouble coming up with a list of my sins! (And maybe a few of yours as well?!) Primary among them is how to love those who see the world in such a different way than I do.

Reflections from Pastor Barry– Continue

Lent is many things. first among those things is the need to walk. Yes, walk- walk with those whose lives are different from our own. It is when we actively choose to walk with the other that we gain understanding and grow in empathy for our fellow siblings, created in the same image of God as you and me. Lent is the season to remember the walking of the people of God out of bondage in Egypt through the wilderness to the promised land. 40 years is a lot of walking! In fact, it is a lifetime of walking. Maybe Lent reminds us that we are to walk with Jesus each and every day of this life we have been given and especially when we feel that it is only wilderness that surrounds us. It is only when we walk with Jesus that we truly understand the discipleship to which we have been called. Of course, Jesus walks with us every day whether we “see” it or not.

For the victims of violence and those who perpetrate that violence I pray, Lord have mercy, Christ have mercy, Lord have mercy. And all the more as Lent approaches I pray that God have mercy on me and remind me to ever walk with Jesus.

Voices of the Saints




Ansgar-(c.AD 800-865) Ansgar was born a son of a nobel Frankish family. He entered the Benedictine abbey, where he was educated. By 823 he was teaching in the monastic school at Corvey. Here he began his pastoral work. When Harald, an exiled Danish king, appealed to the Carolingian emperor [Louis I](#) for support, Louis dispatched Ansgar to accompany and assist the king in evangelizing [Denmark](#). In 826 Ansgar began missionary work in Schleswig. Harald's downfall in 827 and the death of his assistant, Autbert, were blows to the mission.

In 829 Ansgar returned to the Franks. With the help of Witmar, a monk from Corvey, Ansgar began his evangelization of [Sweden](#). Ansgar was cordially received by King Björn to preach the Gospel. The king made Ansgar the bishop of Hamburg. There, Ansgar founded a monastery and a school and in 834 the King endowed him with the Turholdt Abbey as the center of his activities.

After King Louis died, his empire was divided and Ansgar lost the Turholdt Abbey. The Danes unexpectedly raided Hamburg, destroying all the church's treasures and books. Through this political turmoil. Ansgar continued his northern mission building a church north of Hamburg.

Ansgar died in Bremen in 865. He is known for being the monk who helped bring Christianity to Scandinavia . He was named a bishop of Hamburg. He is remembered on February 3 for his love for poor people.

Voices of the Saints



Polycarp-(AD 69-155) Polycarp was orphaned at an early age, but at the direction of an angel, he was raised by the pious widow Kallista. After the death of his adoptive mother, Polycarp gave away his possessions and began to lead a chaste life, caring for the sick. He was very close to St. Bucolus who ordained Polycarp as deacon, entrusting to him the preaching of the Word of God. Soon after, Polycarp was ordained to the holy priesthood.

The emperor Marcus Aurelius came to the Roman throne and started persecution against the Christians. The pagans demanded that the judge search for Polycarp. During this time Polycarp, at the persistent urging of his flock, stayed in a small village in Smyrna. When the soldiers came for him, he went out to them and invited them in to eat. He asked for time to pray, in order to prepare himself for death.

Polycarp was brought to trial and confessed his faith in Christ, and was condemned to be burned alive. The executioners wanted to nail him to a post, but he declared that God would give him the strength to endure the flames. The flames encircled Polycarp but did not touch him, coming together over his head in the shape of a vault. Seeing that the fire did no harm to him the pagans stabbed him with a dagger. Tradition has it that so much blood flowed from this wound that it extinguished the flames. His body was then cremated. He is remembered on February 23.




